

Introduction

This Question Guide is an index to the many topics that have been examined in the Edmonton Areas Study (EAS) and the Alberta Survey (AS) over the years. It is a quick reference source for professional researchers and students who are seeking survey data on the characteristics, behaviours and opinions of Alberta and Edmonton residents.

The first EAS was completed by the Population Research Laboratory PRL in 1977. Until 1990, these annual random sample surveys of roughly 450 Edmonton adults (age 18 and older) were completed face-to-face, in the homes of respondents. Beginning in 1991, all interviews were done by telephone.

The first Alberta Survey (AS) was undertaken in 1987. This province-wide random sample survey of adult Albertans (age 18 and older) incorporates the Edmonton Area Study. Until 1990, Edmonton interviews were completed face-to-face, while the remainder of the Alberta Survey was conducted by telephone. Since 1991, all interviews have been completed by telephone. Edmonton interviews may include a few additional questions since the costs of telephoning within Edmonton are lower.

Random-digit-dialling techniques are used to select households. Within selected households, a quota system is used to obtain a sample with equal proportions of women and men. Sample sizes in the Alberta Survey have ranged from 1045 to 1345. Edmonton has been over-sampled in these surveys, to generate local samples large enough to allow the continuity of the EAS. Province-wide estimates are subsequently weighted to reflect the proportion of the population living in Edmonton, Calgary, and other parts of the province.

Each year's study contains a substantial number of questions on a special topic (see list below), smaller sets of questions on a range of additional topic, and basic socio-demographic questions. Questions are submitted by professors and graduate students in the Department of Sociology. In addition, researchers elsewhere on the University of Alberta campus, along with a variety of government departments and community (non-profit) groups participate in the survey on a cost-sharing basis.

Data from each year's study becomes publicly available six months after completion of the study. The Sampling Report for each year is available in the PRL, as is a list of publications based on these annual studies. Data sets themselves can be accessed through the Data Library (UA Rutherford North Floor 1).

This Index lists the various topics on which data have been collected, by year and question number. For example 1988 (44) under 'Marital Status' indicates that in, 1988, the item soliciting information on the current marital status of respondents was question number 44. Frequently, single listed questions may contain a number of sub-questions (a, b, c, and d, for example). Interested users should refer to the actual questionnaires used in the surveys.
