We now also offer an International Dual Degrees Program. You can begin your 3-year degree at Concordia University of Edmonton and complete your 3rd year at Université Bretagne Sud-France. You will earn both a Bachelor of Arts in French from Concordia University of Edmonton and the Licence Lettres Modernes from Université Bretagne Sud-France. If you are interested in studying at the Université Bretagne Sud-France, please contact Concordia's International Office at the beginning of Year 2.

While your degree planning is directed by the specific requirements for your chosen concentration and minor, it is also driven by your own personal interests; therefore, it is most effective when you are the master of your own academic planning.

Please be aware of all prerequisites, corequisites, and other registration regulations for all courses required within your degree. Program planning can be very effective to identify potential courses needed in addition to specific requirements. Refer to [section 4.0](#) in the *Concordia University of Edmonton Calendar* for more information regarding registration policies.

You are also responsible for registering in and completing the courses necessary to obtain your degree as per [section 10.0](#). The *Concordia University of Edmonton Calendar* is the final authority regarding program requirements and academic regulations.

Concentration Requirements

27-30 credits required, to include:

- a. FR 211 and 212
- b. FR 251 and 252
- c. 3 credits of unspecified 400-level FR courses
- d. 12-15 credits of unspecified 300- or 400-level FR courses.

In addition to the above, students must complete:

- e. 6 credits of ENG courses.
- f. 6 credits in any courses offered by the departments of Social Science and/or Psychology (CNST, ECO, HIS, INDG, POEC, PSCI, PSY, SOC).
- g. 6 credits of courses offered by the Faculty of Science.

Permissible minors:

All minors listed in [section 10.6](#), except for French and Forensic Studies.

Sample Program

Below is a sample sequence of courses if you plan to complete both the Bachelor of Arts in French from Concordia University of Edmonton and the Licence Lettres Modernes from Université Bretagne Sud-France. Keep in mind that this is only an example; you may find a different sequence works best for you. Also note that not all courses can be offered every semester. To earn a 3-year Bachelor of Arts degree, students must present credit in a 30-level Language Other than English or one of ARAB 102, CHIN 102, FR 102, GERM 102, GRK 102, HEBR 102, LAT 102 or SPA 102. **Please speak to a Registration Advisor regarding this language requirement.**

+According to [section 10.2.2.A.10](#) of the *Concordia University of Edmonton Calendar*, you must complete a minimum of 72 credits in the Faculty of Arts and/or the Faculty of Science. Therefore, only a maximum of 18 credits from the Faculty of Education or the Faculty of Management may count towards this degree program.

In Year 3, because you will receive 10 credits of EDFD 3XX courses (Faculty of Education courses), it is recommended that you carefully consider whether minors such as Business, Education, Early Childhood Education or Physical Education and Sports Studies will fit within your degree program.

~To ensure students meet the minimum 27 credits required within the French discipline, FR 372 will be required.
