Dr. Craig N. Shealy is Executive Director of the International Beliefs and Values Institute and Professor of Psychology at Western Washington University.

Dr. Shealy's long-term scholarly, educational, and professional interests have focused on:

- the etiology, structure, and functioning of the human "self" and "identity".
- how formative variables--such as education, ethnicity, and gender--influence learning, growth, and development, and
- the implications of these complex and interacting processes for actions, policies, and practices in the larger world

Dr. Shealy's research on the etiology, maintenance, and transformation of beliefs and values has been featured in multiple publications. In particular, Dr. Shealy's work on Equilintegration Theory and the Beliefs, Events, and Values Inventory (BEVI) has been used in a wide array of clinical, educational, forensic, leadership, and organizational contexts.

A licensed clinical psychologist, Dr. Shealy is a Fulbright Specialist in Japan, Fellow of the American Psychological Association, Past President of the APA's Division of International Psychology, a Nehru Chair at the Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda, India, and a National Register Legacy of Excellence Psychologist.

Dr. Cecilia Bukutu serves as the Director of the Public Health Department at Concordia University of Edmonton (CUE), and she was awarded CUE's 2022 Gerald S. Krispin Research Award. Dr. Bukutu's passion and dedication to research have been an inspiration to the CUE community.

In recent years, Dr. Bukutu has undertaken a number of public health-focused research activities, including projects regarding health information-seeking behavior among post-secondary students during the COVID-19 pandemic; food allergy knowledge, practices, attitudes, and training in Alberta food establishments; and polystyrene management and disposal options in Alberta

Dr. Bukutu has also been actively involved in a number of knowledge translation initiatives, including:

- the Alberta Youth COVID-19
 VacciNATION Campaign, funded
 by the Public Health Agency
 of Canada, that encouraged
 post-secondary students to
 promote immunization
 efforts by creating and sharing
 original content on social media;
 and
- the Speak Science Simply outreach program, funded by NSERC, that aimed to provide individuals involved in science research with the skills required to effectively communicate and share scientific research work with the general public.
